Purpose: Assessment Management (Software Maintenance)

Amount of Contract: \$47,565.00

Description/Scope of Services:

This contract will enable the district to continue utilizing SchoolCity's STARS Suite of software for a fourth year. STARS is a learning management system that provides a comprehensive assessment and instructional solution to support teachers in identifying and targeting student needs, as well as individualizing instruction based on assessment data. It is used by faculty to develop, administer, score, analyze and report student learning outcomes. SchoolCity has item banks of assessment questions tagged by standards that teachers can use to develop exit tickets, quizzes, or tests. In addition, the district has developed portals in the system to hold common district assessments, such as the benchmark reading assessment; the district has also worked with SchoolCity to import screening data from FAST and SRI, as well as MCAS data from the state, to ensure all assessment data are in one place. In year three, the district is positioned to house almost all of its common assessment data — both those intended for formative and summative purposes — across ELA, math, science and history/social studies in SchoolCity to enable teachers and leaders to see a more comprehensive learning profile of students.
